







As I write this letter our new early learning center is literally being constructed outside my window! We broke ground in April 2023, and the project has been on-budget and on-time, thanks to A.D. Miller, our incredible contractor. In May 2023 we sadly lost our friend, long-time board member and owner's rep, Steve Prokopiak. It was a true blessing when AJ Seastone, recently retired from a career in construction, stepped in to fill Steve's shoes as owner's rep. At the December 4th Framing Party, our capital campaign champions filled the building to write Bible verses and encouragements on every piece of exposed framing, ensuring our little ones will always be surrounded by the love of God and the love of our champions. Capital campaign champions - you gave our teen moms hope for a place to belong for their little ones!

In 2023 we served 250 teen moms, the largest number to date! Our incredible staff completed a major research-based revision to our rubric, the tool we use to measure our teen moms' progress toward self-sufficiency. We developed a new housing logic model and defined an increased scope of work for mental health programming. Twenty-two teen moms attended Faith Week in June, and 10 of those mamas made a decision to follow **Jesus.** We implemented a new Career Mentorship Program and started our very own Teen MOPS group, which just melted my heart, as Hope House originated out of a Teen MOPS group over 20 years ago! And 591 volunteers served our teen moms and children in every way imaginable, from serving meals, to holding babies, to tutoring, to event help and more! Staff and volunteers - your love and dedication gave our teen moms hope for their future.

In 2023 Hope House Northern Colorado served 25 teen moms through their resource center, Hope House Cañon City opened their Residential Program and Hope House Orange County in California became our first out-of-state affiliate! In breaking news, I finally finished the Hope House book, A Place to Belong, which you'll be able to read as early as this summer. Finally, you – our Hope House Champions – invested so generously in our teen moms that we completed our \$6 million capital campaign, surpassed our event goals and had a record-setting December, allowing us to end the year positively and invest in our operating reserve, ensuring the ministry's sustainability. Hope House Champions - you gave our teen moms hope that it's possible to break the cycle of poverty for themselves and their children.

Your faith, love and generosity are behind the stories of transformation on the following pages of this report. I am so incredibly grateful to partner with you in this work!

The Empower Program provides opportunities for personal, educational and economic self-sufficiency for teen moms. This includes educational assistance through High School & GED and College & Career Programs. Additional supportive services include healthy relationships and personal growth classes, mental health support, licensed counseling, legal advocacy and financial literacy. Community building activities and events are also offered to build personal support systems and relationships with other moms.

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Personal Growth

Classes specialize in increasing teen moms' self-awareness so that self-confidence can flourish, which positively impacts all other aspects of life.

59 teen moms served.

49 teen moms participated in faith-based activities (i.e. Bible studies, Faith Week and Faith Nights).

Mental Health Support

73 teen moms served.

37 teen moms received services for counseling or referrals.

331 counseling sessions provided.

Community Building

130 teen moms participated in community-building activities.

High School & GED Program

56 teen moms participated.

76% graduation rate, compared to the national average of 50%.

College & Career Program

45 teen moms enrolled in higher education.

10 teen moms received degrees or certifications.

28 institutions of higher education were attended by teen moms.

Economic Support & Financial Literacy

\$111,116 in direct assistance provided (i.e. housing support, transportation, basic needs. children's needs and legal expenses).

175 teen moms had an Individual Growth Plan (IGP).

Legal Advocacy

83 teen moms served

76 legal matters resolved.





Hope House Colorado's Housing Support Program provides metro-Denver's only Residential Program where parenting teen moms can live and work on self-sufficiency with the goal of obtaining stable, long-term housing for themselves and their child(ren). The program also provides housing navigation, which includes housing opportunities with our low income and transitional housing partnerships; navigation of rental agreements and eviction processes; education through housing classes; and in some instances, rental assistance. Hope House utilizes Colorado's Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) and remains updated on the Colorado housing market, legislative activity and upcoming housing opportunities.

Residential Program

15 teen moms served.

Housing Support Program

124 teen moms served.

18 teen moms received rent assistance.

2 teen moms bought their first homes.




EARLY LEARNING & SCHOOL AGE PROGRAM

Hope House Colorado offers an Early Learning & School Age Program that provides literacy and social-emotional development, early intervention services and school-age supports for children, and a Parenting Program for teen moms. The program is designed to support our children in developing the skills they need to succeed in school; demonstrate what quality early learning looks like; and assist our teen moms in transitioning their child to full-time quality child care when they are ready.

191 children served.

21 children successfully transitioned into quality, licensed child care centers.





Ages Served: All teen moms must start in our program before age 21. We serve moms until age 25.

© FUNDRAISING HIGHLIGHTS

In 2023, we hosted our three annual fundraising events:

10th annual Hope House 5K & Fun Run

On May 6th, we hosted our Hope House 5K & Fun Run at a new location, the Apex Center in Arvada! This location provided great out-and-back 5K and fun run courses along Ralston Creek Trail. All ages came out to enjoy the day's events, whether running at top speeds, cruising with strollers, walking with friends or sprinting in the Diaper Dash! Several of our teen moms and their little ones participated alongside program staff after having trained for the race at Hope House Running Club sessions from February to May. Through sponsorships, registrants and donations, we raised over \$88,000!

Joe Coors Hope House Classic

In July, our annual golf tournament took place for the eighth year at the prestigious Sanctuary in Sedalia, Colorado. Twenty-eight foursomes enjoyed a day on the course, and despite a major hailstorm that had golfers rushing to the clubhouse at the end of the afternoon, the day was fantastic! Golfers finished the day by hearing directly from Jamilee, one of our teen moms, enjoying dinner and participating in a live auction. Over \$250,000 was raised to empower teen moms!

21st annual Ignite the Night Gala


The 21st annual gala took place on October 21st at The Westin Westminster. Over 450 guests enjoyed a cocktail hour and silent auction, followed by a three-course meal in the hotel's ballroom. Two teen moms, Alyissa and Maria, shared their inspiring stories of transformation; and our Founder & Executive Director, Lisa Steven, spoke to guests about the critical needs of the teen moms we served, specifically around the housing and mental health crises many of them were facing. A fun live auction and dance party finished off the evening. Through the collective generosity of auction donors, bidders, sponsors and attendees, the 2023 gala raised a record-breaking \$544,176!

In 2024, we aim to continue increasing our visibility in the community so more teen moms and their children can experience your generosity and see their lives transformed at Hope House!


We are working to increase visibility of **Hope House** in a variety of ways in 2024!
